**Sam Winter, PhD** is a psychologist, clinician, researcher, and teacher working in trans health, wellbeing, and rights. He now works in Perth at Curtin University’s School of Public Health. He has worked with a range of agencies and community organizations worldwide and has published around 140 scholarly works. In 2012 he authored UNDP’s ‘Lost in Transition’, the earliest UN publication exclusively focused on trans health in Asia and the Pacific. He was a member of a WHO Working Group recommending removal of trans diagnoses from ICD’s mental disorders chapter. He was a lead commissioned author for the Lancet’s 2016 trans health series. He was a WPATH Director from 2009 to 2018.

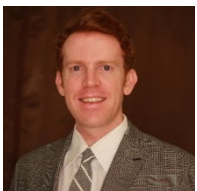

**Cianán Russell, PhD**

**Cianán Russell, PhD** (they) is a Senior Policy Officer at ILGA-Europe based in Brussels, Belgium, working on policy and advocacy relating to trans, intersex, health, education, and the anti-gender movement in Europe and Central Asia. They started LGBTI activism in the US in 1996 and have previously worked with the Indiana Transgender Rights Advocacy Alliance (USA), the Asia Pacific Transgender Network, and Transgender Europe.

Cianán is also the Director of Trans Survivors Network, an international NGO focused on research, advocacy, and awareness-raising related to the needs and care of trans and gender diverse people exposed to sexual violence, sexual assault, and rape.

**Kirill Sabir** is a co-founder and Head of the “FtM Phoenix” Group, a Russian American transgender initiative focused on advocating for transgender health in Eurasia.

Before co-starting the Group in 2008, he was a volunteer co-editor and peer adviser at “FtM Perehod”, [www.ftmperehod.com](http://www.ftmperehod.com), one of the first Russian-language community-owned hubs in Eurasia about sex/gender transition. His respondent’s and reviewer’s contributions include the WHO’s Consolidated guidelines on HIV prevention, diagnosis, treatment and care for key populations, the USAID’s comprehensive study “Testing the Waters: LGBT People in the Europe and Eurasia Region”, the Council of Europe’s country report “The social situation concerning homophobia and discrimination on grounds of sexual orientation in Russian Federation” and others. To raise trans issues during the IDAHOT, he wrote an essay “How it feels to be a trans activist in Russia”.

In 2011-2013, Kirill volunteered as a Board Member representing transgender people at ECOM – Eurasian Coalition on Male Health, an association of NGOs and activists working on sexual and reproductive health, including HIV, among MSM and transgender people in Eastern Europe and Central Asia, established with support of the UN agencies. In 2013, he led the FtM Phoenix’s official Russian translation of the WPATH Standards of Care for the Health of Transsexual, Transgender and Gender Nonconforming People (version 7) and then inspired and organized the 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> Eurasian Trans Health Conferences in Moscow – the first two Russian-language events specifically regarding transgender medical care in the region. The conferences brought together 75 healthcare professionals and LGB/transgender activists from 9 Eurasian countries to discuss transgender health and helped to start a dialogue related to changing the situation around complicated or non-existent sex reassignment/legal gender recognition procedures for trans people in Eurasian countries.

 <p><b>Amy Tishelman, PhD (Chapter Lead)</b></p>	<p><b>Amy Tishelman, PhD</b> is a clinical psychologist, the Director of Clinical Research, and a Senior Attending Psychologist for the Gender Management Service (GeMS) at Boston Children’s Hospital (BCH), as well as an Assistant Professor at Harvard Medical School. Dr. Tishelman is an invited member of the Child/Adolescent committee of the World Professional Association of Transgender Health (WPATH) and has been asked to serve as the lead for the “Assessment, Support and Therapeutic Approaches of Children” chapter for new transgender health Standards of Care-Version 8 by the WPATH Board of Directors. She is currently the chair of the Child and Adolescent Committee for the World Professional Association for Transgender Health (WPATH), serves on both the child and adolescent committees that are revising the WPATH Standards of Care, and served on the American Psychological Association subcommittee that developed guidelines for working with transgender individuals as well as a Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) committee that created a consensus statement about the harm in using conversion therapy for LGBT youth. She has a private practice outside of Portland, OR where she works with transgender and gender diverse children, adolescents, and adults for therapy and assessment. She also provides consultation and training to providers and clinics around the country and internationally. She is often a go-to source for media outlets, including The New York Times, The Atlantic, the Washington Post, the BBC, and most recently, 60 Minutes.</p>



She was the lead expert in the lawsuit that overturned Medicare’s exclusion of surgery, has been instrumental in the passage of anti-discrimination laws, provided testimony that helped establish legal precedent for the rights of transgender individuals in the workplace and appropriate treatment for prisoners, including the first case to provide surgery to an incarcerated transwoman. She is a member of the Screen Actors Guild and has appeared on hundreds of television and radio shows, including *Oprah*, regarding transgender issues. She was chief psychologist at the Chicago Gender Center and is the president of New Health Foundation Worldwide. She is the honoree of *Randi and Fred Ettner Transgender Health Fellowship*, at The University of Minnesota Program in Human Sexuality and a member of the University of Minnesota’s Leadership Program and was invited to present evidence-based care of transgender people to the Director of the Office of Civil Rights at the Department of Health and Human Services. 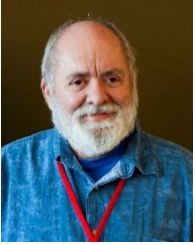
